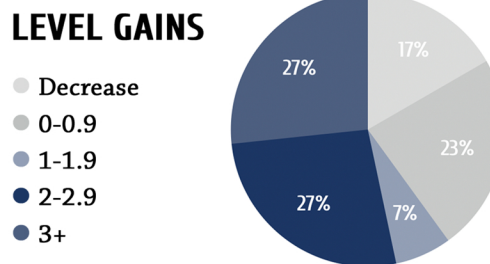
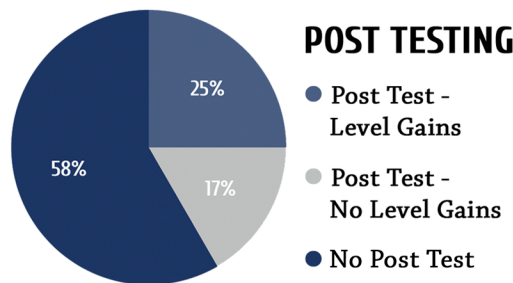


OVERVIEW

In the United States, an estimated 30 million people over the age of 16 read no better than the average elementary school child. Yet, the ability to read and write is the basis for all other education. Literacy is essential if we are to eradicate poverty, improve infant mortality rates, address gender inequality, and create sustainable development. Without literacy skills - the abilities to read, to write, to do math, to solve problems, and to access and use technology - today's adults will struggle to take part in the world around them and fail to reach their full potential as parents, community members, and employees.

Project Read served 72 students this past year to combat the cycle of illiteracy in Utah County. This report details its successes.

80% of students who were retested increased their skills in either reading, language, or math, and the average gain was 2.6 grade levels.
